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# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

#### **Objectives and activities**

The charity's objectives are:

The advancement of health and the relief of those in need by the relief of those in need by reason of youth, age, ill health, disability or financial hardship by;

a) encouraging and supporting local people to share their experiences of health and social care;

b) ensuring the involvement of local people in the commissioning, design and scrutinizing, reviewing and monitoring of health and social care services;

c) the promotion of transparency and accountability within the health economy;

d) the provision of information and advice to the general public about health and social care services.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Priorities for the year

Our priorities are set by the public via a public engagement process. In 2019/20 our priorities were: Cancer Screening, Discharge from Hospital, Young People's Emotional Health and Wellbeing. We also worked with Healthwatch colleagues across Greater Manchester to do public engagement on the NHS Long Term Plan. We produced the report for this work and won a 'highly commended' award from Healthwatch England. In March 2020 the Covid-19 pandemic started to make an impact and as a result of the advice from government we were forced to work differently. Because of the impact of the crisis and social distancing rules, we were unable to continue to do any face to face engagement work. Therefore we decided that we would have to roll our Discharge from Hospital work forward into the next year's work plan. We also started to co-design digital engagement work with Bolton University to gather public feedback about Covid-19 and will be co-producing feedback reports to Bolton Council and Bolton CCG to assist in their public health messages and communications.

#### Information and Advice

During 2019/20 Healthwatch Bolton information, advice and guidance service continued to provide an effective and valuable service to the people of Bolton. During the period the information and advice service dealt with 127 enquiries.

#### Volunteer and member development

Voice: Local is a membership organisation. During 2019/20 the organisation had 223 members The organisation continued to support an active volunteer base, with a total of 18 volunteers taking on role of IT support, trustees and Enter and View Authorised Representatives.

#### Engaging with the Public

During 2019/20 we gathered the views of 2,098 members of the public during subject, site or target group specific engagement projects. We collected 2,312 individual comments from the public and we made 317 new contacts. We also received 1,300 completed cancer screening surveys. We distributed over 1,000 promotional items including leaflets and pens. We held 12 public events including outreach, market places and forums. Our social media following continued to grow and at the end of the year we had 3,005 followers on social media (Twitter 2,420, Facebook 330, Instagram 255).

## TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### Research and the Evidence Base

During 2019/20, we had to streamline the amount of work we could undertake due to less money being available than was originally understood. It was discovered there had been errors in the budget. We also lost key staff members to redundancy – our Senior Research Officer, our Chief Officer and our Independent Chair. We have produced 2 reports from the cancer screening and young people's emotional heath. As well as this we had to change the way we work to support our public health colleagues in the coronavirus pandemic. We launched surveys to gather public feedback and began a project being co-produced with students from Bolton University on placement which will continue throughout the pandemic.

The Greater Manchester Research Unit continued to develop, publishing a detailed research framework and working with our national body, Healthwatch England and colleagues from across the Healthwatch Network on the development of a National Quality Standard in research, on developing research training modules and on preparing the forthcoming National Research Library. Work has progressed on the Research Governance Framework being rolled out to all Local Healthwatch. Training sessions have taken place and Local Healthwatch have been asked to pilot the framework. The second part of the work which was to establish a Customer Relations Management system has not gone to plan due to awaiting decisions from Healthwatch England. This work has currently stalled.

#### Partnership Working, Engagement, Co-production, Co-design

Healthwatch Bolton worked closely with Bolton CCG and voluntary sector colleagues on delivering professionals briefing sessions on informing people about the current landscape of mental health provision in Bolton, Bolton's Transformation Plan and information about Thrive and 'Be kind to My Mind' campaign. The intention was to deliver parent and carer sessions in schools but this was put on hold due to the pandemic. Healthwatch Bolton also worked closely with the Greater Manchester Screening and Engagement programme to co-design and co-produce engagement sessions for women from a variety of sections of the community to establish known barriers and knowledge to accessing cervical screening and to highlight potential cancer champions. We also worked with Greater Manchester Healthwatch to deliver engagement sessions on the NHS Long Term Plan.

In Bolton we continued to represent people's views in a wide variety of strategic and decision making forums at local level as well as to send representatives on behalf of Healthwatch in Greater Manchester to groups working on transformation and service planning at a city wide level.

#### Working with other Local Healthwatch

The organisation continues to work with Healthwatch colleagues across Greater Manchester. The Network undertook an external review during the year and was successful in winning a £60,000 investment from Healthwatch England and the Greater Manchester Health and Social Care Partnership which was supposed to help it respond to the review by creating a more formal structure and governance arrangements at Greater Manchester level. The money was allocated via grant agreements between Voice: Local and the host Healthwatch. Voice: Local held the grant agreement to administer the finances and record keeping. Healthwatch Tameside were unable to fulfil the 2nd quarter of their grant agreement (to pay the fees for Healthwatch representatives to attending meetings advised by the Greater Manchester Health and Social Care Partnership), so it was agreed that Voice: Local would pay the fees from the remaining monies.

#### Plans for the Future

We will continue to work with our colleagues across Healthwatch in Greater Manchester and will continue to look at opportunities to income generate. There is still no agreed way to commission Healthwatch consistently across Greater Manchester, despite being given funding to work on this (via the grant agreements). The issue appears to be that commissioners cannot agree a way forward.

We have established a Management and Strategy Group made up of 4 trustees and the Operations Manager. The role of this group is to oversee the work of Healthwatch Bolton regarding strategic matters, governance, HR, finance and support the staff team. We are also working to produce a new website to be launched in summer 2020. Regarding our workplan we have agreed to look at mental health for adults and children, and social care which were the top priority areas voted for by the public of Bolton. We will align this work to the current pandemic of Covd-19 and continue to gather public feedback on this. We will also contribute to ongoing work with Bolton MBC and Bolton Public Health.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### Financial review

Up to 31/3/2020 the organisation continued to hold the Healthwatch contract for Bolton and to act as financial host for Healthwatch in Greater Manchester, holding the funds provided by the Health and Social Care Partnership and Healthwatch England on behalf of that group.

The contract with Bolton MBC ended on 31st March 2020. Because it was identified that there would be a deficit in the budget for 2019/20, in July 2019 Voice: Local was instructed by Bolton MBC to produce a recovery plan to ensure the continuation of the company's operations and provide at least 3 months' running costs in reserves by the end of March 2020. This has been achieved. The recovery plan included key staff redundancies and scaling down running costs on premises, equipment etc. The recovery plan was accepted by Bolton MBC and Voice: Local was informed that the contract for Healthwatch Bolton would remain in place for the foreseeable future. Currently there is no written contract; one was being negotiated before the pandemic struck and we hope to be able to agree to as soon as is feasible.

The financial performance of the organisation is shown in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 6 and its financial position at year end is outlined in the balance sheet on page 7.

#### **Reserves policy**

The charity ended the previous financial year with free reserves of £33,109. A review of our reserves policy concluded that we should aim to:

(a) ensure that the organisation can cover its liabilities and

(b) work towards having free reserves equivalent to at least 3 months' operating costs.

At year end our free reserves of £30,879 enable us to satisfy the measure set at (a), but fall below the target at (b). However, given the uncertainties that we faced financially earlier in the 2019/20 year the trustees are satisfied with the position and are confident that we have a sound financial platform to build on going forward.

#### **Risk review**

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to those risks.

## TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### Structure, governance and management

Healthwatch Bolton was set up by statute in April 2013 with a 'Shadow Board' and a parent company (The BHA for Equality) appointed by the Local Authority. In May 2014 Healthwatch Bolton became constituted in its own right and registered with the Charity Commissioner under the name Healthwatch Bolton. The registered charity number is 1157070. Healthwatch Bolton became fully independent in July 2015.

During 2016 Healthwatch Bolton was successful in winning the contract to run Healthwatch Wigan and Leigh and as a result of this development it was necessary to review the governance arrangements.

Consequently, Healthwatch Bolton became Voice: Local. It retained its original charity status (as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (by Association)) and charity number, 1157070. However, since Healthwatch England Guidance says that there cannot be more than one Healthwatch branded organisation in any locality, the charity changed its name to Voice: Local. (This name change request was submitted to the Charities Commission in April 2017 and approved in June 2017). Voice: Local is used as a contractual name and the organisation continues to trade under the Healthwatch Bolton. It no longer holds the contract for Healthwatch Wigan and Leigh.

During 2019/20 the organisation had an Independent Chair who supported the trustees and acted on behalf of the organisation as representative to the Health and Wellbeing Board and a wide range of other bodies, both locally and regionally. The Independent Chair, Mr Jack Firth resigned in October 2019. The Chief Officer, Alice Tligui and Senior Research Officer, Alex Tan were made redundant in June and November 2019 respectively.

The trustees' report was approved by the Board of Trustees.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### **Charity information**

VOICE: Local is a CIO constitued in its own right and registered with the Charity Commissioner. The registered charity number is 1157070. The charity was previously called Healthwatch Bolton.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for services provided in the normal course of business.

#### 1.5 Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrued basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities. It includes both costs that can be directly allocated to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them. It also includes costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity, the professional fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity and costs associated with the staffing and the general running of the charity.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures and fittings

33% straight line

#### 1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand.

#### 1.8 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

#### Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those held at fair value through income and expenditure, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each reporting date. Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows have been affected.

#### Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 1.9 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

#### 1.10 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.
